Arrival...

... by train

Take the train and drive environmentally friendly to Nuremberg. The DB main train station in Nuremberg is linked to national and international railway networks by IC (Intercity) and ICE (Intercity Express) trains. Fürth can be reached in just a few minutes by subway (U1), but also by rapid transit (S-Bahn) and regional trains.

... by long-distance bus

Environmentally friendly mobility at an affordable price. A relaxed journey to Nuremberg is possible with the comfortable long-distance buses and there are a large number of connections. The Central Omnibus Station (ZOB) is located in the immediate vicinity of the main train station.

... by car or by bus

Nuremberg and Fürth are conveniently situated at the junction of the important federal autobahns A3, A6, A9 and A73. Moreover, 4 major federal highways lead in all directions.

... by air

Close proximity to the city, short stretches to the terminal as well as direct flights from Germany and Europe – this is what the Albrecht Dürer Airport in Nuremberg stands for. It can be reached from the city center in only 12 minutes by subway (U2).

If you like to travel with a bicycle, you can arrive in Nuremberg via the Five-River Cycle Path, the Regnitz Cycle Path or the Hohenzollern Cycle Path. 15 Imperial Castle

The Imperial Castle was one of the most important fortified imperial palaces of the Holy Roman Empire in the Middle Ages. For centuries, it stood at the center of European history and served as a secure military outpost and prestigious accommodation for the emperors. Erected under the Hohenstaufen and their successors on top of older buildings, the extensive castle complex is world famous as the landmark of Nuremberg.

Emperor - Empire - City

The exhibition "Emperor - Empire - City", with a tour through the historic rooms of the Imperial Castle, offers not only a detailed look at the content and function of the structure itself, but also interesting information on the Holy Roman Empire of the German Nation and the role of Nuremberg in the late Middle Ages - all conveyed to visitors, large and small, in a fascinating and stimulating manner. Valuable objects on loan and impressive reproductions in this authentic location enable visitors to experience Nuremberg's Golden Age and the castle's unique history from the Middle Ages to the nineteenth century. The tour leads from the Knights' Hall through the Double Chapel up to the great hall of the castle and from there to the weapons collection of the Germanisches Nationalmuseum in the Imperial Castle Museum.

Double Chapel and Palas

From an art history perspective, the Romanesque Imperial Chapel is the most important part of the Imperial Castle. It was built around 1200, together with the Palas. The Palas includes a hall building with two large chambers lying above one another as well as a residential wing with several private rooms. The Palas and Double Chapel were skillfully adapted to the irregular contours of the rocky hill. Characteristic of double chapels are two chapels with an identical ground plan lying above one another, which may be linked through an opening in the center of the floor. The ruler's gallery - a specialty of the Nuremberg Double Chapel - allowed the emperor direct access from the upper hall and the imperial chambers of the Palas and, at the same time, a certain distance from the royal court. A heated oratory was built for Emperor Charles V in 1520.

Sinwell Tower and Deep Well

The Sinwell Tower - a round tower in the outer bailey visible from a long distance - was a keep, serving both defensive and prestige purposes. Built in the late 13th century, the slender tower received another floor in the 1560s, with an overhanging platform crowned by a Renaissance spire. The platform offers wonderful views of the castle and Old Town. Photos taken before and after World War II illustrate the amount of destruction and reconstruction caused by the war.

The Deep Well at the center of the outer bailey was most likely built during the earliest construction phase to provide an autonomous water supply for the castle. Its shaft was driven almost 50 m into the rock below, a depth which can be appreciated by a camera lowered into it during a vivid guided tour.

15 Imperial Castle Museum

The Imperial Castle Museum, a branch of the Germanisches Nationalmuseum, shows the historical role and the changing tasks of the Nuremberg Imperial Castle. In the earlier residential building excavation finds, ornamental architectural elements, models and reconstruction sketches illustrate the history of this important site. The castle was not only a defensive complex, but also served research activities. In 1677, for instance, Eimmart built an observatory on the Vestner Gate bastion which became world renowned for its accuracy of measurement. It owed its precision to its astronomical clock, a shining example of contemporary science.

Exhibition

The collection of historical defensive and offensive weapons, such as body armor, firearms and pole weapons, shields and other accessories, demonstrates how the art of warfare changed throughout the centuries. The exhibition includes ceremonial and tournament armor as testimony to the medieval art of the armorer, crossbows used for hunting and sport and inventively shaped pole weapons of the foot soldiers and landsknechts or mercenaries. Firearms began to dominate the battlefields from the 16th century onwards. Historical saddles, stirrups, snaffles (bits for bridles) and spurs make reference to the important role of the horse in terms of military use as well as in tournaments and travelling.

18 Albrecht Dürer's House

Albrecht Dürer's House located just below the Imperial Castle, was the living and working quarters of one of the most famous painters, graphic artists and theoreticians in art history, namely Albrecht Dürer (1471-1528).

The massive half-timbered house – built in 1420 – was acquired by Dürer in 1509 and here is where he also died in 1528. The building miraculously survived the devastating bombing of the Nuremberg Old Town in 1945 and is thus today one of the few undestroyed burgher's residences from Nuremberg's Golden Age, which is at the same time the only surviving late medieval artist's houses in Northern Europe. Already as of 1828 one of the earliest artist's memorial sites internationally, the house was remodeled into a museum in 1871 and was extended by an annex in 1971. It contains living rooms and kitchens as well as a large workshop with functioning printing equipment. The rooms today convey an authentic atmosphere and reflect the history of the house

The modern Dürer Room presents historical copies of Dürer's paintings. The Graphic Cabinet displays changing exhibits of objects from the rich portfolio of the Graphic Collection of the city of Nuremberg as well as original graphic works from Dürer.

In the workshop historical printing techniques are explained and demonstrated. Interactive media stations convey a lively insight into the work and personality, life and times of the great genius.

And, last but not least, "Agnes Dürer", an actress in costume who plays the role of the wife of the artist, accompanies guests personally through the home of the master painter.

32 Germanisches Nationalmuseum

In the Germanisches Nationalmuseum in the heart of Nuremberg, a fascinating trip through time of 600,000 years of European art, culture and history awaits you. Dive into a blend of high and everyday culture, which offers you a one-of-a-kind insight into the cultural heritage of Europe.

From antique influences to masterful works from artists such as Albrecht Dürer and Wilhelm Lehmbruck – the stories that shaped Europe are told here. Discover artifacts such as the UNESCO Memory of the World Behaim Globe, a golden hat from the Bronze Age, the Eagle Brooch from Ravena and an astrolabe from Syria, all which reflect the changing history of mankind.

A walk through the museum is also a trip through the history of architecture: The postmodern entry hall leads to a Gothic Carthusian Monastery; the green gardens of the interior courtyards are reflected in classic modern glass structures from Sep Ruf – together they make up the GNM.

3 Neues Museum Nuremberg Art and Design

In the heart of Nuremberg, the Neues Museum with its sweeping glass façade stands out in contrast to the medieval city wall. The museum with its incisive modern architecture is a lively place for contemporary art and design.

Paintings, sculpture, photographs, video art and installations from 1945 until today are spatially linked in a unique format with the international design collection. For the design area, the museum cooperates with the Neue Sammlung – The Design Museum in Munich.

A highlight is the third-largest collection of works of the painter Gerhard Richter, one of the most important and well-known contemporary artists. In three rooms, the museum presents an impressive ensemble of his work. This is made possible by a generous permanent loan from the Böckmann Collection.

Several exhibits per year and a wide-ranging education program inspire visitors and invite them to exchange ideas. This is complemented by a diverse event program with lectures, talks, discussions and concerts, which, in an interdisciplinary fashion, has made the museum into an important center in the cultural life of Nuremberg.

12 Deutsches Museum Nuremberg - The Museum of the Future

How will we live in 10, 20 or 50 years? How will technology develop – and what challenges will that bring us as a society? A branch of the Deutsches Museum in the heart of Nuremberg's Old Town invites you to share in a fascinating and informative look into the future. The museum asks technical and ethical questions and contrasts science and fiction throughout the exhibit. Are the objects on display created by science and already used or almost ready for production? Or are they completely fictional and could never be real? Inventions from science fiction literature and films, but also scientific and theoretical observations and thought experiments are all part of the mix.

The permanent exhibit covers 2,900 square meters of space, focusing on five thematic areas. These begin with an individual's personal environment in "Work and Daily Life" and "Mind and Body". A broader perspective is opened with the themes "System City" and "System Earth". The final thematic area explores the dream of mankind to travel through "Time and Space".

A library with science fiction literature, a "Future Workshop" and hands-on laboratories round out the presentation. A special highlight is AMECA, a humanoid robot with anthropoid facial expressions and gestures, who welcomes visitors for a chat. A team of "Future Communicators" are always available during your visit to answer questions or exchange ideas.

42 Museum Tucher Mansion and Hirsvogel Hall

A visit to the Tucher Mansion, built from 1533 to 1544, lets you vividly imagine how Nuremberg high society – in the form of one of the largest trading dynasties – lived in the 16th century. The collection, which still is property of the Tucher Cultural Foundation, contains valuable furniture, tapestries, paintings and precious handicrafts. Particularly impressive are the double chalice from Wenzel Jamnitzer and the ceremonial porcelain service from the workshop of Pierre Reymond in Limoges as well as a memorial painting of Adelheid Tucher and a portrait of "Jerusalem Pilgrim" Hans Tucher VI from the workshop of Albrecht Dürer's teacher Michael Wolgemut.

The idyllic garden, laid out in a Renaissance style, invites you to enjoy a picnic or a game of boules and offers a splendid view of the magnificent Hirsvogel Hall (originally built 1534, destroyed 1945, reconstructed 2000). With the exquisite wall paneling by Peter Flötner and the famous painted ceiling by Georg Pencz, a pupil of Dürer, it ranks as one of Germany's loveliest Renaissance interiors. Twelve plaster of paris busts of the first Roman emperors complete the interior ensemble.

Every Sunday an actress assumes the role of the former lady of the house, Katharina Tucher, and gives a tour of the mansion and the Hirsvogel Hall and entices you to explore the historical secrets of the Tucher Mansion.

The foyer, castle courtyard, garden and Hirsvogelsaal can be hired for weddings, company celebrations, cultural events or private events.



14 City Museum at Fembo House

The Fembo House is the last still surviving merchant's and patrician's residence in Nuremberg from the Renaissance and Baroque period. Erected between 1591 and 1596 by the Dutch cloth merchant Philipp van Oyrl at a prominent site between the Town Hall and the Imperial Castle, today it houses the Nuremberg City Museum.

On the way through the house splendid historical rooms from past epochs come alive: The dancing hall, the Baroque antechamber or the "Beautiful Room" from the Peller House reflect even today the splendor of the patrician residences.

Currently, the permanent exhibit of the museum is being gradually modernized. In February 2024, the first part of the new presentation opened: An introduction to city history will surround the large model of the Nuremberg Old Town in the top floor of the museum. A media installation creates new perspectives of Nuremberg with a camera flight above the city.

On several levels, the permanent exhibit tells the history of Nuremberg using selected objects from the art collection of the city of Nuremberg – from the formation of the city in Early Modern times until the 20th century. A new "Children's Trail" turns the route through the museum into an exciting search and guessing game for the whole family.

On the ground floor, the exhibit "A Crown – Power – History" invites you to learn about the most important eras in the city's history in just 30 minutes with the use of replicas of the Imperial Insignia.

21 Toy Museum

The Toy Museum – as a place of "the big world in miniature" – explains the world in an enjoyable, cheeky and cheery way with historical and current toys. The museum shows toys in all their variety from the ancient world until today, with an emphasis on the 19th, 20th and 21st centuries.

The spacious and bright kick-off room on the ground floor welcomes visitors with a spectacularly designed city model of Nuremberg – not true to scale, but therefore built completely out of toys. The foyer also offers many opportunities to play and discover.

A true treasure chest for toy fans is found in the upper stories: On display are countless interesting objects – from magnificent doll houses and detailed toy stores to fascinating optical toys to amusing tin toys, from sophisticated metal building sets to one of the most unusual model railways in the world: The "Omaha Railroad".

In the attic there is a large play area for children and adults. The objects on display from international companies such as Lego, Barbie and Playmobil tell the story of the history of toys after 1945.

On the expansive and unusually designed museum playground, children can play to their heart's delight surrounded by nature and discover some historical toys. From May to October, guests can have a bite to eat at the summer café of the museum and enjoy the historical courtyard in the heart of Nuremberg's Old Town.

60 Documentation Center Nazi Party Rally Grounds

In 1933, Hitler chose Nuremberg as the „City of the Nazi Party Rallies“. Still today, the remains of the massive structures built by the Nazi Party on the former Rally Grounds in the south of Nuremberg bear witness to the yearly propaganda show of their National Socialist regime. The Documentation Center Nazi Party Rally Grounds is located in the north wing of the Congress Hall, which was designed for 50,000 spectators but never completed. The modern structure of the Documentation Center slices diagonally through the historic building, setting a clear architectural signal opposing the monumental severity of the Congress Hall.

The Documentation Center is currently being renovated. Until the museum and its new permanent exhibit reopens at the end of 2025, an interim is available. Entitled „Nuremberg – Site of the Nazi Party Rallies. Staging, Experience and Violence“, it uses numerous objects, photos and films to provide information about the history of the Nazi Party Rallies and the Grounds in both German and English.

For the first time, national history is told through a local perspective, with biographies and eyewitness accounts providing personal points of view on the subject. There is also an extensive programme of guided tours and events.

On the grounds themselves, information panels along a 90-minute route describe the history of a particular location.

76 Memorium Nuremberg Trials

World history was changed in the Nuremberg Palace of Justice: On November 20, 1945, the trial of 21 leading representatives of the National Socialist regime began in Courtroom 600. They had to answer for their crimes in front of an international court of justice. After eleven months, the judgement was pronounced on October 1, 1946. From 1946 to 1949, twelve trials before US military courts took place, known as the Nuremberg Military Tribunals (NMT).

The Memorium Nuremberg Trials, an information and documentation center located at the original site in the top floor of the palace of justice, provides information on the background and reason for these historic trials, the proceedings themselves and their impact from then until today. The Nuremberg Trials were a milestone in the development of international criminal law and made Courtroom 600 world famous. Historic sound and film footage convey a vivid impression of the trial proceedings. In Courtroom 600, the media installation „Zeitreise Saal 600 | Courtroom 600: Time Travel“ is played several times a day: Elaborate technology lets the public immerse itself in the sound and sights of this historical event.

In „Cube 600“, located in front of the building, there are free-of-charge regular special exhibits on display.

55 Museum for Communication

For more than 120 years, guests in the museum can explore current topics about communication and try things for themselves.

Four themed areas currently focus on the understanding of sounds, images and writing as well as communication on the Internet. More than 400 objects – from a telephone switchboard to smartphones and tablets – and many media stations vividly bring content and history to life.

At interactive stations, children and adults can do many things themselves, whether in a writing workshop, using a pneumatic delivery system and the newsdeks or by taking a media competence test. In the reconstructed burial chamber of the ancient Egyptian craftsman Sennedjem, the relationship between writing and the cult of the dead becomes clear. One can dive into the secretive world of coded communications in the redesigned cryptography area.

The museum belongs to the Post and Telecommunications Museum Foundation, which is supported by the German Post AG and Deutsche Telekom AG. Special exhibits and a wide variety of events and activities – from on-line tours to workshops for groups and individual visitors to Data Tuesday – round out the offerings of the museum.

A special attraction are rides with the historical post coaches of the museum. In the summer, they take place in the countryside north of Nuremberg and in Fürth. During the Christkindlesmarkt, one can ride through the Christmas lights and decorations of the Old Town. The post coach and our rooms can be rented for events.

55 DB Railway Museum

Founded in 1882, the DB Museum is today the oldest railway museum in the world. Under the umbrella of the German Railway Foundation, the history of the German railway through all epochs is kept alive.

At the heart of the museum is an exciting stroll through 200 years of the history of trains in Germany. A major attraction is the original rolling stock. About 40 rail legends await visitors in two halls. With an app developed by the museum, many of the cars can be seen in 360 degrees or with the help of Augmented Reality.

On the first floor of the museum, the Modellarium is a true treasure trove: With more than 2,000 models, from historical trains in 1:5 scale to a locomotive in miniature format 1:700, the showcases are full of treats. Next door is an historical model railway system, whose relay technology makes it unique worldwide.

Younger guests should not miss the Kid's Trainland (KIBALA). It offers everything to make a child's heart leap for joy: Many hands-on stations and the KIBALA Express Train invite everyone to play and learn.

On the 15,000-sq-m large outdoor space, little train fans can have a great time thanks to a Bobby-train, a light railway to ride and a picnic area and playground. In the summer months, changing themed exhibits invite you to explore in the open air. In addition to its collection, the German Rail Museum offers a varied program of children's events, museum festivals and activities for those interested in culture and railroads.

94 Dinosaur Museum Altmühltal

Meet T. rex, Brachiosaurus & Co.

The Dinosaur Museum Altmühltal in Bavarian Denkendorf (between Nuremberg and Munic, on the Autobahn A9) is a fascinating place for families, school classes and everyone who is interested in the development of our planet and would like to learn about it first-hand. Here, you'll stroll along a circa 1.5-km-long path through both the forest and 400 million years of the history of the earth. You'll encounter **more than 70 life-sized reproductions of dinosaurs** and other animals from ancient times, some of which are so large they reach the treetops.

In the hall of the museum, an authentic skeleton of a **Tyrannosaurus rex** is on display: Although "Rocky" was almost 10 meters long, he wasn't finished growing and is therefore the only teenage T. rex found so far!

Other highlights of the museum are "Dracula" – perhaps the largest and heaviest flying dinosaur yet discovered – as well as an original fossil of the ancient bird **Archaeopteryx**.

In the Dinosaur Museum, knowledge is conveyed through active experience. You can try to be a paleontologist and uncover fossils, which you can take home as a souvenir. Hands-on stations show how large, fast or strong the dinosaurs were and allow you to compare them to yourself.

In the new prehistoric workshop, you have the unique opportunity to experience how experts dissect real dinosaur bones and fossils.

Museums in Fürth

A visit to museums in the “Cloverleaf” city of Fürth doesn’t mean looking at old objects in display cases, but to experience history, discover new topics to explore and to dive into interesting new worlds. The best example for a modern museum presentation is the Ludwig Erhard Center: A one-of-a-kind exhibit, documentation, meeting and research center for German economic history and Ludwig Erhard.

The City Museum presents an impressive overview of the history and development of Fürth, including a tour of Fürth around 1700 with the help of Virtual Reality.

In the Jewish Museum of Franconia, one can get a glimpse into the varied Jewish history of Fürth and Franconia. A Mikveh and an original historical Sukkah are two of the highlights.

A must for those who love contemporary art is the kunst galerie fürth. Four or five times a year, the municipal gallery introduces national and regional artists, integrating international positions on art.

Criminology, prevention and the history of the police in Fürth are in focus in the small, but fine crime museum, which is open Sundays or upon request.

If you are interested in dialysis, you can find answers in the Dialysis Museum. Upon request, you can learn about blood cleansing from the ancient world until today.

The Radio Museum is closed for renovation and the creation of a new exhibit until at least 2026.



F2 Ludwig Erhard Center

The Ludwig Erhard Center (LEZ) is a unique exhibit, documentation, meeting and research place about Ludwig Erhard and his concept of the social market economy.

The 1,400-sq-m large permanent exhibit begins in Erhard’s apartment in his former birth house and presents, for the first time, photographs and artifacts of his family and their textile business. While the birth house focuses on Fürth’s Erhard, his biography and the history and economic history before 1945, the new structure next door looks at Ludwig Erhard as a politician, his concept of the social market economy and the economic and societal development of the Federal Republic of Germany. The exhibit ORIGINAL LUDWIG ERHARD, the so-called treasure trove, is also located here. It contains authentic pictures and objects from Erhard’s personal estate. With many artifacts, museum reenactments and more than 50 media stations, the LEZ presents history in a lively and entertaining fashion. Highlight and end point of the permanent exhibit is the digital room of the future, which offers visitors an interactive multimedia experience.

After a visit, the museum’s Café Luise invites you to refresh and relax. The newly restored rooms of the former white goods shop of the Erhard family are decorated in the charming ambience of the 1950s and 60s.

Until March 2025, the LEZ will display a special exhibit “Henry – World Influencer No. 1. The History of the Kissinger Family of Fürth”, celebrating the 100th birthday of Henry Kissinger. The exhibit contains many previously unknown objects – many from the history of Fürth – as well as unique artifacts and touching private articles.



As early as 1380 Nuremberg's traditional beer was stored in the subterranean cellars, sometimes comprising four levels, that had been cut into the typical Nuremberg sandstone. During World War II the historical underground vaults served as air raid shelters. Follow us into the Nuremberg rock-cut cellars, a fascinating labyrinth made up of a myriad tunnels and cellars, which were hewn out of the rock face many centuries ago. During a tour, you can discover this unique subterranean cellar system and learn interesting facts about the laws and regulations in the cellars. You will also learn something about the various uses of these cellars over the last 700 years and the craft of brewing beer in the Altstadt Hof brewpub.

Amongst the historic buildings of Old Nuremberg the world-famous Peller House with its prestigious courtyard had a special status. No other burgher's residence could compete with the splendid building on the north side of the Egidienberg. After it was almost totally destroyed in WWII, the Friends of the Old Town have been working on the reconstruction of the courtyard since 2009. In 2018 the elaborate sandstone work with the decorative gable on the north side was completed. The courtyard can now be admired in all its splendor.

Nuremberg was second only to Dresden in the amount of destruction seen in World War II. Despite that, a large part of Nuremberg's art treasures survived the war in a one-of-a-kind art bunker. After the war, an almost medieval Old Town was rebuilt from the ruins. How was protection of art and reconstruction a success?

84 Atomic Bunker - Surviving World War III

Only five minutes to make it to the bunker. There, there is enough air, water and light for 14 days. A place to lie for eight hours, a place to sit for 16 – together with 2,000 other occupants of the bunker. What awaits after two weeks? An exit into a destroyed and radioactive world. In the originally equipped atomic bunker, one can explore civil defense in the Cold War as a contrast to today, technical equipment and the organization of life in the bunker.

63 Nuremberg Zoo

In front of an impressive backdrop of sandstone cliffs roam tigers, lions and polar bears. Dolphins and sealions swim together in an water landscape. The manatee house with its tropical plants, floating manatees and brightly colored butterflies brings the feel of the rainforest to Nuremberg.

With its around 65 hectares, the Nuremberg Zoo is one of the largest zoo in Europe. The extensive woodland park features craggy rock formations, century-old trees and idyllic meadows and ponds. Within this landscape one can observe around 300 different types of animal species. With the climate high forest trail, there is a new highlight in the zoo: Visitors can stroll among the treetops and test their courage at 20-meter-high play stations. The climate high forest trail was made possible by a grant from the Future Foundation of the Sparkasse Nuremberg.

Many play areas, where kids can go wild, and many picnic areas are distributed throughout the zoo as well as a restaurant and several bistros. And those who don't want to walk the whole way can take the "Kleiner Adler" mini train from the entrance area to the children's zoo and back. Guests can find barrier-free routes listed in the zoo app, which can be downloaded free from the app store.

Protection endangered species in Nuremberg and Latin America

Today, the protection of endangered species and nature is one of the most urgent tasks facing zoos. The Nuremberg Zoo therefore cooperates with partners in Germany and around the world to protect threatened animals. One important part of this effort is Yagu Pacha e.V., an organization based at the Nuremberg Zoo with the goal of protecting the aquatic mammals of South America and their habitats.

10 Church of Our Lady (Rom. Cath.)

The three-aisled Church of Our Lady was the first Gothic hall church in Franconia and is among the three most important churches in Nuremberg. Erected in 1355-58 by Emperor Charles IV, the imperial regalia were displayed to the public in 1361. The “Männleinlaufen” (mechanical clock and glockenspiel, every day at noon) recalls the proclamation of the Golden Bull of 1356: seven Electors pay homage to Emperor Charles IV sitting on his throne. Significant artworks in the Church of Lady are the three oldest stained glass paintings in Nuremberg from the Emperors Window donated by Charles IV, the Tucher altarpiece, created by an unknown master ca. 1445 and the most important example of panel painting before Albrecht Dürer as well as two memorial plaques by the famous Nuremberg sculptor Adam Kraft and panel paintings by Michael Wolgemut. The Nuremberg Christkindlesmarkt is opened from the balcony.

7 St. Lawrence Church (Prot. Luth.)

Construction began about 1250. Originally built as a three-aisled basilica in the high Gothic style; later extended with an imposing late Gothic hall choir (1439 – 1477).



Visitors are received at the magnificent west facade with a splendid portal richly decorated with statuary and a rose window made of stone (mid-14th c.). The two towers rise to heights of 80 and 81 meters. Important works of art inside are the Annunciation by Veit Stoß (1518), the tabernacle by Adam Kraft (1496) as well as numerous medieval altars, memorial plaques and stained glass paintings.

The three-part Laurentius Organ is one of the largest organs in the world. More than 12,000 pipes and 165 registers make church services and organ concerts in the St. Lawrence Church a unique experience. Equally resounding is the ringing of the bells. The oldest of the 16 bells dates back to the 14th century.

20 St. Sebald Church (Prot. Luth.)

Construction began on St. Sebald Church, a Late Romanesque pillared basilica with two choirs, in 1230/40. By 1379 the original side aisles had been widened, the towers raised in the High Gothic style and the Late Gothic hall choir built.



Inside the church stands the reliquary shrine (ca. 1397) in the tomb cast in bronze by Peter Vischer and his sons (1508 – 1519). The bones of Nuremberg's Catholic patron saint Sebaldus are presumed to rest in the silver embossed “casket”. The wealth of the city of Nuremberg and its patrician families is reflected in numerous figures and memorial plaques by the woodcarver and sculptor Veit Stoß as well as the stained glass windows by Veit Hirs Vogel, made according to designs by Albrecht Dürer and Hans Süß.

40 St. Giles' Church (Prot. Luth.)

St. Giles' Church is Nuremberg's only Baroque church as well as the oldest site of a church. It dates back to the former Schottenkloster (Irish Benedictine monastery) which was erected here around 1140 on the site of a royal estate from the earliest period of settlement in Nuremberg.



Today's building was erected between 1711 and 1718. The adjoining historical chapels are accessible upon request.

5 St. Clare's Church (Rom. Cath.)

The single-nave Catholic church of St. Clare was consecrated in 1274 as part of a convent of Poor Clares and is one of the oldest sacred buildings in the city. Worth seeing are the three-part altarpiece of the Holy Cross by Hans Springinklee with delicately carved scenes of the Passion, a wooden Madonna on the Crescent Moon from the end of the 15th c., a monumental Crucifixion group by Veit Wirsberger as well as the grave of Caritas Pirkheimer. Since 1996 St. Clare's Church has been an open church without a parish and is home to the Catholic City Pastoral Care of Nuremberg. **Open:** Daily 9 am – 9 pm

28 St. Elisabeth's Church (Rom. Cath.)

Originally, St. Elisabeth's Church was part of a former commandery of the Teutonic Order of the Knights. The dilapidated Gothic chapel was demolished in 1785 and replaced by the mighty Neoclassical building. 40 marble red columns structure the choir, rotunda and entrance hall of the interior. The 50 m high dome above the rotunda is dominated by twelve monumental apostle statues.

29 St. James' Church (Prot. Luth.)

The quaint Gothic Church of St. James was originally the hospital church of the Teutonic Order of the Knights and is today the meeting point for pilgrims along the Way of St. James. Objects to see include the oldest winged altarpiece in southern Germany (ca. 1360/70), a Pietà made of limewood as well as a small Gothic tabernacle within the high altar. Today's building was erected from the mid to the late 14th century. "The Lamentation of Christ" is an outstanding work of 15th century Nuremberg sculpture.

4 St. Martha's Church (Ref. Prot.)

The Gothic St. Martha's Church, built in the 2nd half of the 14th c., is known for its notable original stained glass windows. In 1356 it was donated together with the Pilgrim Foundation of St. Martha by the patrician family of the Waldstromer; in 1525/26 it was closed as a consequence of the Reformation and served as an auditorium and performance venue for the mastersingers of Nuremberg. On June 5, 2014 the church was gutted by a fire in the roof and was rebuilt.

The St. John's Cemetery is one of the most important burial sites in Europe. You can stroll between gravestones decorated with flowers to the gravesites of Albrecht Dürer, Veit Stoß, Ludwig Feuerbach and other famous Nuremberg citizens. Art historically significant are the bronze memorial plaques, the Gothic St. John's Church as well as the Holzschuher Chapel by Hans Behaim the Elder. Worth seeing in the interior of the St. John's Church are the main altarpiece, the sandstone tabernacle as well as funerary monuments and memorial tablets.

In the cemetery established in 1518 Peter Vischer the Elder as well as the composer Johann Pachelbel have found their final resting place. The Late Gothic and Renaissance Rochus Chapel, built according to plans by Hans Behaim the Elder, is an art historical treasure chamber. Inside are found stained glass windows by Veit Hirsvogel made according to designs by Albrecht Dürer, a high altar by Hans Traut, two artistically crafted side altars as well as panel paintings and memorial plaques.

33 The Way of Human Rights

The Way of Human Rights is entered through a stylized triumphal arch from the Kornmarkt and lined by 27, 9-meter-high concrete pillars. Inscribed on each of them and on two ground plaques as well as the integrated cypress oak is an article of the General Declaration of Human Rights in German and another language.

“Culture of Remembrance”

The walkthrough work of art flanking the Germanisches Nationalmuseum created by the **Israeli artist Dani Karavan** (born 1930, died 2021) not only changed Nuremberg's image but also heightened the entire city's consciousness of its obligation to the past. The Way of Human Rights in Nuremberg uniquely displays the force of momentous ideas.

International Human Rights Award

The award was presented for the first time on September 17, 1995, almost 60 years to the day after the passage of the National Socialist Racial Laws and 50 years after the end of World War II. The biennial award presentation is the culmination of Nuremberg's broadly conceived aim of doing justice to its self-imposed commitment as the “City of Peace and Human Rights”.

31 Zirkelschmiedsgasse Quarter

Historically the area around the Zirkelschmiedsgasse, Mostgasse, Schlehengasse and Pfeifergasse is as old as the castle; in the mid-11th c. a royal estate also stood here.



In the Middle Ages comb-makers, gold-beaters, weavers and bell-makers lived here. The narrow streets are characterized by different styles of houses with numerous dormer windows, exposed half-timbered facades and completely renovated houses.

31 Historical Grilled Sausage Restaurant “Zum Gulden Stern”

The historical Grilled Sausage Restaurant “Zum Gulden Stern” is Nuremberg's oldest existing grilled sausage kitchen still operating on its original location. Built ca. 1380, it was first officially mentioned in 1419.



The inn survived the many wars in this area and is worth visiting at its original site.

13 Town Hall of Nuremberg

The Town Hall is a complex of several construction periods. The oldest section is the 40 m Gothic hall erected between 1332 and 1340, once the largest secular hall construction north of the Alps. The adjacent section built from 1616 to 1622 by Jakob Wolff the Younger was modeled on the Italian palazzos of the High Renaissance.



In 1945 the entire complex was destroyed by bombs. Reconstruction 1956 – 1962.

24 Former Wine Depot

With a length of 48 meters the Weinstadel is one of the largest half-timbered houses in Germany. Built from 1446 to 1448, the lepers of the city were fed during the Holy Week. As of the 16th century craftsmen, poor families and the infirm were provided shelter here. From 1571 the free imperial city of Nuremberg stored some of their stocks of wine here.



Today the interior of the Weinstadel has been modernized and accommodates a student dormitory with its own canteen. The romantic ensemble with the Hangman's Bridge and the Hangman's Tower makes it one of the most popular photo motifs in Nuremberg.

22 Tanners' Lane

The largest Nuremberg ensemble of old craftsmen houses is found in the Weißgerbergasse. The primarily half-timbered historical burghers' residences, often with their own well and a garden, reflect the wealth created by the leatherworking trade.



Today, instead of busy medieval tanners, cafes, bars, small shops and craft businesses enliven Tanners' Lane.

11 Beautiful Fountain

Built ca. 1385 – 1396 by Parlier and stonemason Heinrich Beheim. The 19 m tall stone pyramid rises from the octagonal basin like a Gothic church spire, tapering in three stages to the finial. Four rows of 40 stone figures represent the world-view of the Holy Roman Empire. The railing with the famous brass ring that can be turned, and has been replaced several times, was made in 1587.



In 2016 the Beautiful Fountain was renovated at great expense and water is flowing once again.

27 Marriage Merry-Go-Round Fountain

The "Marriage-Merry-Go-Round" designed by Jürgen Weber and erected in 1984 is regarded today as the largest 20th century figural fountain in Europe. Surrounding the dancing Meistersinger of Nuremberg, Hans Sachs, a series of figures display the ups-and-downs of married life in six scenes – from the first stages of infatuation through to death.



The poem "Bitter-Sweet Married Life" written by Hans Sachs for his wife served as a model for the Marriage-Merry-Go-Round fountain and can be read on the heart lying outside the fountain.

The fountain is one of the most well-known examples of German Renaissance bronze sculpture. It displays a peasant from the Knoblauchsland market gardening area wearing 16th c. clothing and holding a goose under each arm.

The Albrecht Dürer Monument designed by Christian Rauch and cast by Jacob Burgschmiet was the first monument in Germany dedicated to honor an artist.

While the bastions were being constructed in the mid-16th c. a new gate was built and the old pointed arch walled off.

1498 – 1502 first built as a grain and salt storehouse; from 1572 imperial city weigh house and customs house.

Stroll through the streets and lanes and experience a typical relaxed Franconian atmosphere. Enjoy a sparkling drink at Fürth’s Market and a cappuccino in one of our small and cozy cafés.

One shouldn’t leave “Clover City” without having a look at the monumental classical City Hall – with its 55-meter-high tower, reminding you of the Palazzo Vecchio in Florence – the neo-Baroque City Theater or the gorgeous promenade in the heart of the town.

Our lively art and culture scene is also waiting to be discovered. Come have a look!



F1 Town Hall of Fürth

The monumental building was constructed 1840 – 1850 from the plans of Friedrich and Eduard Bürklein in the Neoclassical style of the famous architect Friedrich von Gärtner. The 55-meter high tower, the landmark of the city, is inspired by the Palazzo Vecchio in Florence. The industrial town grew so quickly that an extension had to be added just 50 years later. The two staircases and the hall are a “must-see”.

F7 St. Michael's Church

The Michaelskirche is the oldest edifice in Fürth. The beginnings of this fortified church date back to 1100. As befitted the erstwhile small market town, St. Michael is only a simple, relatively unadorned village church. The tower with the west portal, the choir and the south entrance are from the Gothic period. The interior is 19th c. Neo-Gothic.

F6 Gustavstraße

In the past Gustavstraße was one of the most important trade routes. Nowadays it is the heart of the pub scene and a popular meeting point, especially in the evening.

Particularly attractive is the Baroque sandstone building of the Grüner Baum Inn, where the Swedish king Gustav Adolf is said to have stayed overnight in 1632. Anyway, it is after him that the street is named.

F23 Freemasons' lodge house

The outstanding building of the Fürth Masonic Lodge in its historicized style was built in 1890/91 by the Nuremberg architect Leonhard Bürger. It presents the ideas of the Free Masons in stone. The cubic structure is richly decorated with the symbols of this society.



Bürger's design for the massive cube was inspired by the Italian Renaissance, because it was the cradle of humanism and the origin of the concept of tolerance. The Baroque decorative elements express the precious value of these ideas. The building stands in the middle of a large garden, framed by an elaborate fence with wrought-iron elements. On top of the gable, two sculptures of women symbolize **"Truth and Friendship"**, the name of the Fürth Lodge. They express the prosperity and well-being of the lodge, as well as the Free Masons' ideal of the connection of all mankind through friendship. The renovated meeting hall is one of the most beautiful ballrooms in Fürth.

F15 Hornschuchpromenade and Königswarterstraße

These two boulevards from the Wilhemine era (period of rapid industrial growth after unification in 1871) are among the most beautiful in Fürth. From 1883 to 1904 grand houses with elaborate sandstone decoration reflecting the social standing of the upper classes were constructed between Luisenstraße and Jakobinenstraße. Even the spacious promenade with mature trees in the middle is something special. The Ludwig railway line once passed along this central green strip. People were not apprehensive about the noise, but were instead proud of the modern technology directly at their front doors.

The interplay with the adjacent river, the wonderful river promenade and the green meadows on the other side of the water create a very special atmosphere. A visit to the Kißkalt'schen houses and the river promenade is a must – especially on warm summer or sunny autumn days.

F10 Old Jewish Cemetery

This is where the Jewish community buried its dead from 1607 to 1906. The graves were created for eternity and these last resting places must not be disturbed. Despite acts of desecration during the Nazi period, the cemetery, which covers 20,000 sqm and once stood on the edge of town, is to this day one of the most impressive stone testimonies to Jewish life in Fürth.






Walking Tours on Your Own

Walk through the Old Town

Begin your tour at one of the three most important churches in the Old Town of Nuremberg, **7 St. Lorenz** (p. 55). The church features a magnificent portal; in the interior await important artworks from Veit Stoß (The Annunciation) or Adam Kraft, as well as one of the largest pipe organs in the world. The **7 Bavarian Bible Museum** (p. 31) offers fascinating insights about the Bible from a variety of perspectives.

Via the Kaiserstraße and the **Karlsbrücke**, which was erected in 1486, you'll find the **Trödelmarkt**, a small island in the middle of the Pegnitz River, with a lovingly restored ensemble of buildings. The **25 Bratwurst Museum** (p. 35) is worth a stop here. Cross the **24 Hangman's Bridge** (p. 61) - Hangman's Bridge - from which the executioner once reached his isolated home above the river and which today houses the **24 Executioner's House Museum** (p. 33) and you can walk along the Pegnitz to the **Maxbrücke (Photo Spot)**. From here, you have a wonderful view of the **24 Former Wine Depot** (p. 60), and, on the other side of the bridge, the **23 Chained Suspension Bridge** (p. 61), next on our walk. This is considered the oldest surviving metal suspension bridge in continental Europe and leads directly to the **22 Tanners' Lane** (p. 60), whose circa 20 historical houses are mainly constructed of half-timbering. At the end of the lane, past the church of **20 St. Sebald** (p. 55), the oldest parish church in Nuremberg, the way leads up the hill along the Bergstraße. First, you'll encounter the **19 Historical Rock Cut Cellars** (p. 49, **Tip**: Try the Nuremberg Rotbeer) and then the **18 Albrecht Dürer House** (p. 19), the former home and workplace of this famous artist. Over the **17 Tiergärtner Square** (p. 61), which is a favorite place to meet for both locals and guests - especially on warm summer evenings, the route leads up to hill to the symbol of the city, the **15 Imperial Castle** (p. 16). The climb is worth it, not only because of the **Imperial Castle Museum** (p. 18), but also for the fantastic view over the Old Town (**Photo Spot!**). Passing the Sinwellturm, you can descend via the Burgstraße to the **13 Old City Hall** (p. 59) with its **13 Medieval Dungeons** (p. 34). Via the Waaggasse, you'll arrive at the Augustinerhof (**Photo Spot!**), with the **12 Deutsches Museum - Museum of the Future** (p. 22), opened in 2021. The Tuchgasse connects the area with the **11 Main Market Square and the Beautiful Fountain** (p. 60). Don't forget to turn the golden ring and make a wish! On the opposite side of the square, you'll find the **10 Church of Our Lady** (p. 54). Each day at 12 noon, the Männleinlaufen - a depiction of the seven electors who turn past Emperor Charles IV as a reminder of the Golden Bull he issued here in 1356 - takes place on its west gable. On the Main Market Square, the heart of the city, a variety of cultural events take place (tourismus.nuernberg.de/events) and, during Advent, the famous Nuremberg Christkindlesmarkt (www.christkindlesmarkt.de/en).

Our tour of the Nuremberg Old Town ends on the Museumsbrücke, with a view of the **9 Hospital of the Holy Spirit** (p. 61).






Art, Culture and Master Traders

The tour starts with a visit to the **3 Neues Museum - State Museum of Art and Design** (p. 21). Painting, sculpture, photography, video art and various installations provide insights into modern art since the 1960s. After a short coffee break, walk past the 27 concrete pillars of the **33 Way of Human Rights** (p. 58) to the **32 Germanisches Nationalmuseum** (p. 20), the largest museum of cultural history in the German-speaking world. The museum houses important art and cultural treasures from prehistory and early history to the present day, including masterpieces by Albrecht Dürer, Lucas Cranach and Veit Stoß, as well as the Behaim globe and the precious cover of the Codex Aureus.

Along the Kornmarkt and the Dr.-Kurt-Schumacher-Straße you reach the **27 Marriage Merry-Go-Round** (p. 60) after a few minutes. Surrounding the dancing Meistersinger of Nuremberg, Hans Sachs, the figural fountain displays married life in six scenes - from the first stages of infatuation through to death. Sachs's poem "Bitter-Sweet Married Life" served as a model.

Along the city wall and over the **23 Chained Suspension Bridge** (p. 61), the oldest surviving iron chained suspension bridge in continental Europe, the route leads directly to the lively **castle district**. You can stroll, completely relaxed, past historical buildings, half-timbered houses and small cafés, browsing to your heart's content, shopping and finding all sorts of specialties at the **Nuremberg master traders** (nuernberger-meisterhaendler.de).





The Different Nuremberg

Tip: Rent a VAG bike (www.vagrad.de) and explore the city.

All those who like to stroll along the market stalls should make a short detour to the **weekly market on the main market square** before starting the tour. The colorful market stalls are open from Monday to Saturday (7 am – 8 pm) and offer products from the region and Knoblauchsland (Garlic Land), one of the largest contiguous market gardening areas of its kind just outside Nuremberg.

The subway takes you within a few minutes from the “Lorenzkirche” station to “**Gostenhof**”, the trendy district of Nuremberg (www.in-goho.de).

Along the **Fürther Straße** there are numerous stores, second-hand shops, boutiques and craftsmen’s shops, but on the side streets there are also many small treasures as well as Nuremberg’s only unpacked store where food, hygiene articles and much more are offered without packaging (don’t forget your own containers!).

If you’re lucky enough to end up there on just the right day you can enjoy the popular back courtyard markets – at doors with colorful balloons it’s worth taking a look “behind the scenes”.

If you need a break in between, you’ll be in good hands in one of the small cafés, and numerous bistros offer a large selection for vegetarians and vegans. At the end of the day you can enjoy a locally brewed pale beer or the typical Nuremberg red beer in one of the many pubs.

It is also worth visiting “the MUZ” (www.musikzentrale.com), the trendy network scene for musicians and music lovers in Greater Nuremberg, which promotes young artists of all musical genres and offers a stage for alternating events.

Tip: Street art enthusiasts should take a look in the back courtyard!

From the Old Town to Gostenhof

By VAG bike (approx. 2 km)

Start your tour in Waaggasse heading in the direction of Augustinerstraße. Drive straight ahead over Weintraubengasse and Maxplatz to Hallertor. Turn left onto the Westtorgraben and continue following the road along the city wall to the Spittlertorgraben (cycle path).

At the intersection Spittlertorgraben / Am Plärrer (subway entrance) cross at the traffic lights and continue on to Am Plärrer (cycle path). Cross at the traffic lights at Dennerstraße and continue to Fürther Straße.

Culture of Remembrance

As the City of the Nazi Party Rallies, the City of the Racial Laws and the city in which the trials against the main perpetrators of the National Socialist regime took place, Nuremberg has been facing up to the task of coming to terms with the past for many decades and at the same time is shaping its present and future as the "City of Peace and Human Rights".

The tour begins with a visit to the **60 Interim Exhibit "Nuremberg - Site of the Party Rallies. Staging, Experience and Violence"** in the large exhibit hall of the Documentation Center (p. 26). The presentation illustrates in compact form the history of the Nazi Party Rallies and the grounds. The reopening of the Documentation Center Nazi Party Rally Grounds with a new permanent exhibit is planned for 2025.

Afterwards, a tour of the former Nazi Party Rally Grounds is recommended. 23 large panels at the historic site provide information about the buildings, the propaganda staging of the National Socialists and how the site is used today. The individual tour lasts about one and a half hours, alternatively guided tours on foot are offered. Afterwards it is worth taking a short break at the **61 Dutzendteich Public Park** (p. 62).

The **76 Memorium Nuremberg Trials** (p. 27) can be reached by the bus and subway. The "Memorium Nuremberg Trials" in Courtroom 600 – the scene of the trials of the main war criminals from 1945 to 1949 – is an information and documentation center at the original site. It illuminates the prehistory, the course and aftermath of the Nuremberg Trials up to the International Criminal Court in The Hague.

At the end of the day, it is worthwhile taking a stroll through the **33 Way of Human Rights** (p. 58) back in the Old Town. The walkthrough artwork of the Israeli artist Dani Karavan consists of 27 white concrete pillars, each inscribed with an article of the General Declaration of Human Rights in German and in a foreign language, as well as a cyprus oak, two ground plaques and an archway.

The design of the former Nazi Party Rally Grounds in Nuremberg is currently undergoing change: The Congress Hall will become a cultural area with space for artists, the Zeppelin Field and Zeppelin Tribune together with the Dutzendteich train station will be a learning and encounter place and the new performance space for musical theater and dance, which will be a temporary home for the Nuremberg State Theater in the inner courtyard of the Congress hall, is taking on form. Small shops, hip bars, galleries and culinary highlights can be found hidden in the lanes of the Old Town – and there are plenty of places to take a photo!

WINE MARKET

The Wine Market captivates with its unique flair, which can be found nowhere else in Nuremberg. What is special are the many individual and family-owned stores and workshops, which stand for quality and expertise. The spectrum ranges from handmade fashion and sophisticated art to culinary specialties of all kinds.

The Wine Market also has something to offer visually: To the east, the impressive view of St. Sebald's Church; to the west the view into the Weißgerbergasse with its picturesque half-timbered houses. The Wine Market is framed by these scenes and offers a wide-open space in which to stroll and relax. Ever since the street has been designated a pedestrian zone, one has even more peace and quiet. The outdoor tables of the restaurants and the lovingly planted raised beds create an almost Mediterranean atmosphere. Young and old, guests and locals, residents and tourists take a break on the new wooden seating and fill the square with the pleasant hum of conversation.



Our Favorites in the Wine Market

The Weißgerbergasse is our absolute favorite lane in Nuremberg. We often find ourselves taking a roundabout way through town just to walk past its colorful, narrow half-timbered houses. The place where the street enters the Wine Market is the perfect spot to soak up both the flair of the square and the visual beauty of the Weißgerbergasse. As a highlight, you have a view of the dominating towers of St. Sebald.

Photo Spots

You could spend the whole day taking great pictures at the Wine Market. It is particularly atmospheric in the early morning and evening. Evenings, when the warm light begins to shine through the lanes and the outdoor tables at the bars and restaurants start to fill, you have the best conditions for street photography. Mornings, when the first light comes round the corner and the Wine Market begins to wake into life, are also great times to take fantastic shots.





AROUND THE AUGUSTINERHOF

In the middle of the heart of the Old Town, a brand-new quarter has been created with the construction of the Augustinerhof. Set in the best location between the Main Market Square and the Trödelmarkt, the area fits surprisingly well into its environment, while distinguishing itself with its subtle modern design. Extremely central, yet a bit off the beaten path and removed from the bustle of the city, this neighborhood feels like its own little world.

More than three years passed from the laying of the cornerstone to the opening of the compound. Today, within almost 5,200 m² of space, a building complex houses retail, restaurants, a hotel and a museum. In the center runs a wide pedestrian passage, which leads to the south side of the building and the Pegnitz River – one of the few places in the city where you can sit on the banks of the river. The fact that the sun hits the perfect angle in this space – until late in the evening – makes it even more attractive.

Directly bordering on the Augustinerhof complex is the Trödelmarkt with its traditional charm. In the characteristic and narrow row of buildings, cafes and family-owned shops stand side-by-side. The Karlsbrücke and the picturesque Henkersteg link this enchanting strip of island in the Pegnitz with the shore.



Our Favorites around the Augustinerhof

Technically, our favorite place is not in the quarter, but offers a wonderful view of it: The Maxbrücke. Quaint views in every direction set our hearts beating faster – even if we have been here a million times. The Kettensteg on the left side, the Henkersteg and parts of the Trödelmarkt on the right, the Pegnitz below – what more could you want? That's reason enough to include the Maxbrücke again and again in a stroll through the city and pull out your phone for just one more photo.

Photo Spots

An absolute must for every photographer is to take a picture of the Henkersteg from the Maxbrücke. It is most likely the most beautiful photo spot that Nuremberg has to offer. The entire Augustinerhof area is also a solid recommendation for photos! Its modern architecture offers great images from many different angles.

With the Henkersteg, its picturesque form mirrored in the water, the dreamy Trödelmarkt full of lovingly decorated shops and the modern façade of the Augustinerhof, this quarter is the perfect contrast between old and new.





ST. JAMES'S QUARTER

St. James's Quarter is very traditional, but unfortunately often neglected. Located directly on the edge of the city center, it is sometimes dismissed as part of the new and not the old. This doesn't do it justice: St. James's Quarter offers both historical and modern highlights with their own individual charm. In addition to the Weißer Turm (part of the former city wall), the Marriage Carousel honoring the Nuremberg poet Hans Sachs and the churches of St. Elisabeth and St. James, there are many cultural highlights, especially in gastronomy and retail.

The stores, restaurants and other businesses in this neighborhood have often been here for generations. They give this area its special feel and sometimes hide their real treasures.


Our Favorites in St. James's Quarter

It's not difficult to find a favorite place here – there are so many pretty areas. One of our candidates for the most beautiful location is the space between the churches of St. Elisabeth and St. James, where you can see the highlights of this neighborhood at a glance. In one direction is one of the remaining defensive towers in the last city wall; in the other, Weißer Turm, a bastion from the second-to-last wall. This is the perfect place to start a tour of St. James's Quarter.

Photo Spots

Surprisingly, many locals from Nuremberg don't know the golden pig. It is located on the roof of the Bratwurstküche and is a perfect photo motif. A large zoom or a long focal length is recommended. At certain times of the day, you can even incorporate the sun into the picture.





THE CASTLE DISTRICT

The Castle District – Nuremberg’s historical heart which surrounds the symbol of the city, the Imperial Castle. There’s no better place to feel the old-fashioned charm and history of the town – and not only because the silhouette of the castle is always in sight. With its tiny, twisting cobblestoned alleyways and old half-timbered houses, the Castle District is, without doubt, an attraction for many visitors, but it also has something to offer locals. Small individual shops hidden off the beaten path and a multitude of diverse places to eat and drink shape the Castle District: From rustic pubs with original Franconian food to hip bars to culinary variety from all over the world. The attractive castle garden draws both those from the neighborhood and guests of the city to take a break and gaze at its beauty.

Our Favorite Spot in the Castle District

Our favorite place in this neighborhood is, of course, the Imperial Castle. But not at the top on the terrace – although the view is amazing. We like to sit below the castle on the lawn or the sand-stone cliff. With a picnic blanket, something to drink or a book. Here, you have the advantage of seeing the castle and enjoying its atmosphere, but don’t have to walk all the way up the hill (which can be exhausting).

Our Secret Tip: If you want to go all the way to the top: It’s really nice at night!

Photo Spot

The Imperial Castle is a favorite motif and a real eye-catcher from all angles. If you’re standing at the end of the tunnel at the Tiergärtnerort Gate and have a zoom lens, you can shoot a view that is seldom seen with the half-timbered Pilatus House and Restaurant “zum Albrecht-Dürer-Haus” in the foreground.





ST. LAWRENCE SQUARE

St. Lawrence Square is the hub of our beautiful Nuremberg. Here, history meets hustle and bustle. The area around St. Lawrence Church, one of the oldest and most impressive buildings in the city and a symbol of it, is always full of life. There's always something going on here. That's not only because it is located next to the main shopping streets which are the center of Nuremberg's retail sector. St. Lawrence Square is a meeting place in the truest sense of the word. Who hasn't said "let's meet in front of St. Lawrence"? No wonder because it's the perfect spot to go on in all directions.

Our Favorite Spot at St. Lawrence Square

Our favorite place in this neighborhood is a real insider tip: The so-called Pocket Park in der Nonnengasse! Here you can kick back and relax on a lounger. With a little luck, there's a concert going on in the nearby ruins of St. Katharine's and you can take it easy in a peaceful green space.

Tip: Grab a cool drink and a good friend – it's the best way to spend a summer evening!

Photo Spot

Next to the impressive St. Lawrence, easy to overlook and often hidden by market booths during the week, is the weather house. If you are lucky and there are no stands set up, it makes a great shoot in combination with the church! With a wide-angle lens you can get a nice composition with the complete scene. Our tip: By night or early in the morning, the clock on the weather house is lit and is a real eye-catcher!



CRAFTSMEN'S COURTYARD

The Craftsmen's Courtyard is truly a special place. Its individual concept makes it unique – not only within the city of Nuremberg. The name says everything: Surrounded by the historical city wall, the Craftsmen's Courtyard houses traditional and modern craft workshops, focused on typical Nuremberg products. As soon as you set foot in this space, you are sheltered by the massive old gates of the city and can feel the magic of the Craftsmen's Courtyard.

The tiny half-timbered houses which stretch along the narrow lanes don't just look beautiful, but also tell a story. Many trades which once almost died out have been brought back to life here. The former ward in the city wall became a new quarter in 1971, which preserves the traditional in a modern form.

Our Favorites in the Craftsmen's Courtyard

It's difficult to choose just one favorite place in the Craftsmen's Courtyard. The entire courtyard could be a favorite place and should be a stop on a tour of the city. If we would have to decide, it would probably be the large entry gate which leads to the Königstraße.



Photo Spots

You should bring one thing with you to take great photos in the Craftsmen's Courtyard: Time!

The courtyard offers countless subjects to photograph, and these are especially attractive when the little lanes are filled with movement from visitors. It's best to use a longer shutter speed of ca. 1/10 sec. to capture this movement. For the Craftsmen's Courtyard we recommend a whole range of lenses: From an ultra wide-range to 70mm.



Historical Grilled Sausage Restaurant "Zum Gulden Stern"

The famous Historical Grilled Sausage Restaurant "Zum Gulden Stern" anno 1419 is the oldest grilled sausage restaurant in the world. It gives you an insight into the late Middle Ages during the time of Albrecht Dürer, who must certainly have once been a guest here. The house at Zirkelschmiedsgasse 26 was built in 1380 and first documented in 1419, in a district whose buildings formed the nucleus of the historic Old Town of Nuremberg. The premises, consisting of two buildings, survived all the wars and it is the oldest tavern still standing on the same location in Nuremberg. Here you will find many treats. The specialty of the house is, however, the Original Nuremberg "Röstla"®. Martin Hilleprandt, the former owner, registered this trademark in 2013 to protect the Nuremberg grilled sausage. In addition, soups made of potatoes, soup greens, bones and beef are freshly cooked and the potato salad freshly prepared daily in the restaurant. Since 2020, his children Sofia and Martin manage the business in the second generation.

Anyone who wasn't here wasn't in Nuremberg!




Souvenirs from Nuremberg



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
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
